

Prayer Service for the 10th Anniversary of 9/11

Leader: We gather to commemorate the tragedy of September 11, 2001,
to mourn the lives lost and the families impacted,
and to pray for reconciliation and peace in our nation and our world.

Reader 1: Psalm 13

**How long, O God, will you forget us?
How long will you hide your face from us?
How long must we suffer anguish in our souls, grief in our hearts day and night?
Look now and answer us, O God.
Give light to our eyes lest we sleep the sleep of unconsciousness.
For our part, we trust in your true love.
Our hearts shall rejoice, for you will set us free.**

**Reader 2: We pray for all those who died ten years ago
in the destruction at Ground Zero.
And we pray for all those who died as a result of coming to the aid of victims.
May they be in God forever and rest in peace.**

**Reader 3: We pray for all the families who lost loved ones.
May they be comforted and find peace, even in their abiding grief.**

**Reader 4: We pray for all those who sustained injuries in body and soul on 9/11.
May they and their families and all Americans experience healing
from the trauma of this event.**

**Leader: Let us take a moment to mourn all those who have died,
who have suffered and who continue to suffer because of 9/11.
In their honor, we light these candles.**



(Ten candles are lit.)

Leader: To continue to honor the victims of 9/11,
let us seek peace in our own hearts so that we may promote peace
in this nation and peace among all peoples.
We ask the Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ, to open our hearts and to reflect,
during this tenth anniversary of unspeakable violence, on the possibility,
and the hope, of forgiveness, reconciliation and peace
among the entire human family.

Reader 5: At the World Trade Center ten years ago,
The flames and ashes proclaimed our brokenness.
We wept and grieved for those lost, their families,
And for ourselves.

Reader 6: But healing is our challenge and our call,
Our vocation in the Spirit.
We are called by God's grace to see beyond destruction,
To a hope that all life will be cherished so peace will be possible.

Reader 7: We must continue as a human community
To move toward wholeness, to repair the ravages of hate,
To bring together rather than to tear apart.

Reader 8: In the spirit of Jesus, help us always to offer
the open gesture of solidarity to replace the clenched fist,
the refusal of the other's hand.
Only in building an inclusive community do we construct a healing truth:
We are all fragile children of God needing each other for wholeness.

Leader: Let us end by praying for peace and wholeness in all our communities, in our
nation, and in our world with the prayer of Blessed John Paul II:

All: To you, Creator of nature and humanity, of truth and beauty, we pray:
Hear our voice, for it is the voice of the victims of all violence and all wars.
Hear our voice, for it is the voice of all children who suffer when people put their faith in
weapons of destruction.
Hear our voice, when we beg you to instill into the hearts of all human beings the wisdom
of forgiveness, reconciliation and peace.
Hear my voice, for we speak for the multitudes in every country who are ready to walk
the road of peace and to reach out in solidarity to all their neighbors.
Hear our voice, and grant us insight and strength so that we may respond
to hatred with love.
O God, hear our voice, and grant the great gift of peace to all. Amen.
